The Intention of the Workshop Asyut – Dayr al-Barshā

Since the early twentieth century, archaeological research in the major provincial cemeteries of Middle Egypt almost came to a halt, a situation that lasted until the beginning of this century. Since then, two major projects were initiated. One is the joint mission of the universities of Berlin, Mainz, and Sohag in Asyut, the other is the Leuven university mission in Davr al-Barshā and its wider region.

The two sites have a great deal in common. Both belong to major towns in Middle Egypt, both were initially used for building rock tombs for the local elite, later to be reused as a quarry area and as a habitation zone for Coptic hermits.

There are also numerous differences, both in the archaeological assemblages locally present and in the approach of the two projects. Being the two major projects dealing with this type of sites, it is useful for the two research teams to discuss their methods and exchange their results.
